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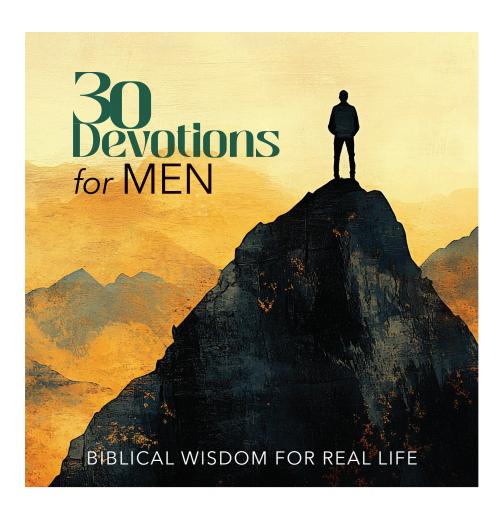

survey conducted by Talker Research of 2,000 men revealed some worrisome results.

Which means you, too, may be occasionally lonely...perhaps alone. And lonely is a dangerous place to find yourself.

Not only is it emotionally tough, it also means maybe you've not yet forged meaningful, transparent relationships with other Christians. If you're doing life alone as a believer....well...that often doesn't work very well.

Think about those nature shows where lions attack a herd of gazelles. The lions target loners, gazelles that aren't tightly connected to the herd. Like that gazelle destined to become a lion's lunch, when you're alone you're more vulnerable.

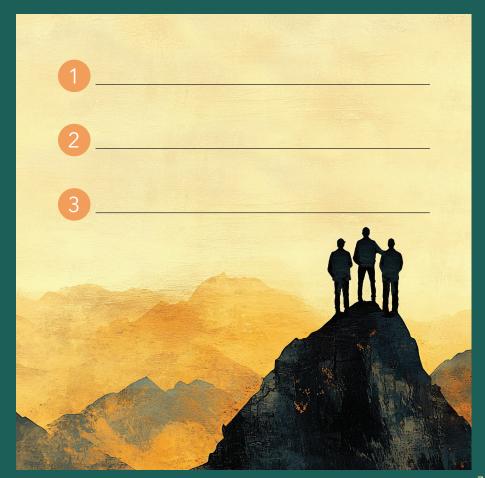
You don't have other believers praying for you. Providing support. Coming alongside you when you're hurting.

Thank them (not at midnight!) for caring. Express your appreciation. Ask them to pray for you as you pray for them.

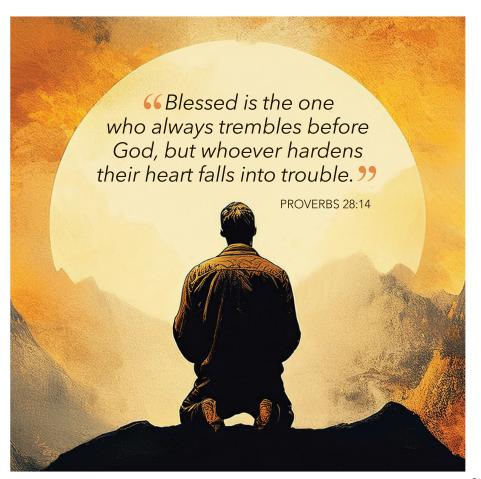
And if you're unwilling to obey Him or you worship half-heartedly...well, those are issues, too.

BANISH BITTERNESS

en are surprisingly good at keeping score.

We can remember who smacked us on the playground in third grade. Who humiliated us with a "no" when asked for a prom date. Who cut corners to beat us out for that bonus at work.

No doubt you can recall even deeper injuries across your life, perhaps some that have been life-altering.

It's not always easy to let go of the bitterness from the wounds you've endured. Anger is justified. Hurt and disappointment take hold.

But bitterness isn't the place to stay. Here's why: Bitterness handcuffs you to painful past events. It's fertile soil for growing an unforgiving spirit and poisons relationships. It can even cause physical harm as you experience stress while replaying past injustices.

Perhaps you've been abused in significant ways. If that's the case, bitterness is a natural response. But it's not a helpful one if you're unable to move past what happened or forgive. It's a place you can't stay.

Don't get sucked into bitterness. Turn instead toward grace—for yourself and those who've hurt you. Tell God what happened and ask for help moving forward. He may point you toward therapy, self-reflection...maybe even forgiveness.
